Outreach Update

I returned from Haiti November 19th and can report our Region 13 Trade School is in full operation with classes well attended by students eager to learn. We observed the Cooking, Sewing, Floral Arts, Tailoring and Computer classes, and delivered supplies for many of the classes, including 3 renovated laptop computers donated by the Bethel Computer Project in Warrenton.



While the St. Marc School was undamaged after hurricane Matthew, our group observed that many homes in the hills around Trouin were damaged and the mission church at Duny was destroyed.

We witnessed a reissuing of loans from our micro-loan program to 14 participants in Trouin and visited the new Pig Farm (Piggery). The Piggery is a partnership between Voix et Actions and the 7 students who graduated from the Trade School last July. It was in good shape, but unfortunately, many of the goats provided through our Goat Program were lost in the hurricane.

Trinity Outreach will continue to make opportunities available for our parishioners and those of other Region 13 churches to provide aid for repair of homes and to replace animals lost in the hurricane.

In October Kilgore recently was involved in the Celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the Opening of the Anglican Centre in Rome. Present were the Archbishop of Canterbury, Primates of the Anglican Community, and Prelates of the Roman Catholic Church. Pope Francis and the Archbishop of Canterbury led a joint service of Evening Prayer in the church of San Gregorio al Celo with the assistance of the combined choirs from the Sistine Chapel and Canterbury Cathedral. During the service combined pairs of Anglican and Roman Catholic bishops were commissioned to work together and follow in Pope Francis' call "that we should walk together as one."








Faith versus works. For centuries, this theological debate has stirred the passions of scholars and clerics. This argument was a driving principle behind the Reformation, with Martin Luther breaking from the long-held focus on works to an understanding of salvation first and foremost through belief in Jesus as savior and redeemer.

In the Anglican tradition, we are closer to Luther's understanding. Yet works are essential to the practice of our faith. Striking a balance between faith and works is a difficult challenge. Many congregations pray and read scripture without acting on it-keeping their doors closed to the larger community. Other congregations become so consumed with works that they become social service organizations, unmoored from the deep truth of God's word.

The argument of faith versus works is worthy of deep reflection. But when it comes to our daily life and practice, we must embrace both, practicing a living faith that spurs us to generous and grand works.
