Harvest Festival Service

A service to celebrate agriculture, to honor Rappahannock farmers, and to give thanks to the Almighty for the harvest, will be held on Sunday, October 21st at 5 pm in Trinity Episcopal Church, Gay Street, Washington, VA.

Known across the pond as "Harvest Festivals," these services are held throughout the Anglican Communion. As might be expected in an event that celebrates the harvest, the hymns are robust and earthy, and the prayers and scripture readings reflect our gratitude for the produce from our farms.

Internationally renowned organist Ronald Stolk will play a short prelude to begin the service, and he will

accompany a small choir of professional singers. Youth from Rappahannock's 4-H club will take up baskets of symbolic harvest offerings to be blessed, and Rappahannock farmers will serve as lectors to read from the scriptures.

We plan to deck out the sanctuary in hay bales, pumpkins, apples, grapes and other of our local agricultural wares. Please join us to celebrate and give thanks for the bounty from our Rappahannock farms!

A **Celebration Reception** follows the service in the Parish Hall. All are invited.



A Short History of the Harvest Festival

The tradition of celebrating Harvest Festival in churches as we know it today began in **1843**, when the Reverend Robert Hawker invited parishioners to a special thanksgiving service for the harvest at his church at Morwenstow in Cornwall. Victorian hymns such as "We plough the fields and scatter", "Come ye thankful people, come" and "All things bright and beautiful" helped popularise his idea of harvest festival and spread the annual custom of decorating churches with home-grown produce for the Harvest Festival service.


